MAPLEWOOD ACADEMY RECEIVES AWARD

20 YEARS OF SERVICE WITH OPERATION CHRISTMAS CHILD

In a world filled with challenges and uncertainties, acts of kindness and goodwill shine even brighter. For two decades, Maplewood has been a Drop-Off Center for Operation Christmas Child, a heartwarming initiative that has touched countless lives around the globe. In October, Maplewood received a service award for their long-standing dedication to the mission.

Operation Christmas Child (OCC) is a transformative project from Samaritan's Purse that has been spreading joy, hope and the love of Jesus to children around the world since 1993. This remarkable initiative invites communities to come together, creating gift boxes filled with toys, school supplies, hygiene items, and a personalized note of encouragement. These boxes, offering a ray of hope during the Christmas season, are then shipped around the world.

Serving as a Drop-Off Center for OCC, Maplewood plays a significant role in collecting and contributing to this cause. Each year, during one week in November, the academy collects around 2,000 gift boxes that are packed into shipping cartons then loaded onto semi-trailers, whose drivers take the gifts on the first leg of their journey around the world.

In October, during a chapel service at the academy, a young man shared a powerful testimony of his childhood in Panama. He had received an Operation Christmas Child box, and he told the students how that experience changed his life and ultimately led him to God. His inspiring story exemplified the transformational power of these gift boxes.

Afterward, Laura Cummings, who has stood at the helm of this project at Maplewood, accepted the Samaritan Service Award on behalf of the academy for their 20 years of continued commitment to this mission. As they continue their ministry, Maplewood serves as an example of how a simple act of kindness can share messages of tangible love and care around the globe.





Seeing the Lord work has to be one of the greatest privileges that there is. To see Him work here at Maplewood, in the lives of others, and in my own life, too, is such a blessing. We know that "if God is for us, then who can be against us" (Romans 8:31), and, as more and more students here decide to take a stand for Christ, it becomes evident that God is willing to do so much more than we could possibly imagine if we are willing to be used by Him.

We started our small groups Sabbath school program recently. It offers a place where you can have people pray for and with you if you're going through something. Or perhaps it is just an environment to have fun and hang out after a long week. This is how we can be leading spiritually. This idea of leading spiritually can sound overwhelming, because we have made it to be something that it is not. I myself am learning how I can show Christ to

someone by simply smiling and asking how their day went, just as much as doing a Bible study with them might communicate God's love.

Being in a praise team has been a blessing to me. The students this year are able to lead out in worship during church services, and we are learning what it means to cultivate a heart of worship, to be praising God for the sake of praising Him and not performing for others. In doing so, the leaders end up being a huge blessing for others.

The small groups, praise team, vespers and many other activities are ways God has been working here, but the greatest thing I've seen is how He is moving and working upon our hearts individually. As we are beginning to choose, for ourselves, to walk with God, He starts doing marvelous things. This is where the power will come from. When each one of us starts to make God a personal God, it will be like a bunch of sparks that, when put together, will create a great flame that cannot be put out.

The best part is that it's only the first part of the year, so I can't wait to see how He is going to be working upon this campus moving forward.

The Caleb Long Memorial Scholarship honors one of our graduates whose short life exemplified the ideals of Maplewood Academy. Caleb was raised in Hutchinson, Minnesota, by parents Mike and Lisa (and later joined by younger sister Ella). He went to Northwoods Elementary through 8th grade and attended Maplewood Academy for four years, graduating in 2021. Caleb then extended his education at Union College as part of the Biomedical Program, and had been one of a select number of applicants accepted to Union's Physician Assistant program for 2024.

Tragically, in November of 2023, Caleb was killed as the result of a motorcycle accident in Lincoln, Nebraska. His loss is devastating to his family as well as to his friends and mentors in both the Union College and Maplewood Academy communities.

Caleb was known as a bright, studious, hard-working young man who was also quick to laugh and show kindness to others. While at Maplewood he worked at the Harmony River retirement home in Hutchinson, gently serving the elderly residents with Godly compassion.



He was a good friend, an excellent athlete, and the type of person whose presence and quiet influence uplifted those around him.

"Caleb Long was a dedicated and caring young man," recalls Maplewood teacher Linda Vigil. "I enjoyed working with him in Bible class because he showed an honest commitment to God. His senior year he shared the following in an assignment and it truly reveals his character. 'I am sure that I am going to get into trouble or hurt or offend people at some point in life. I want to be able to be like Jesus and show love even to the enemy. I never want to be the person that gets angry and fights back. I want Jesus to shine through me, so that I can treat others like He did."

While Caleb's life on this earth was cut short, we await that great heavenly reunion and pray that it's soon. In the meantime, we honor Caleb and commit to furthering his legacy by using this scholarship to invest in another generation of Maplewood students. May they be inspired by Caleb's ambition, determination, and kindness and honor God with their lives as he did.
